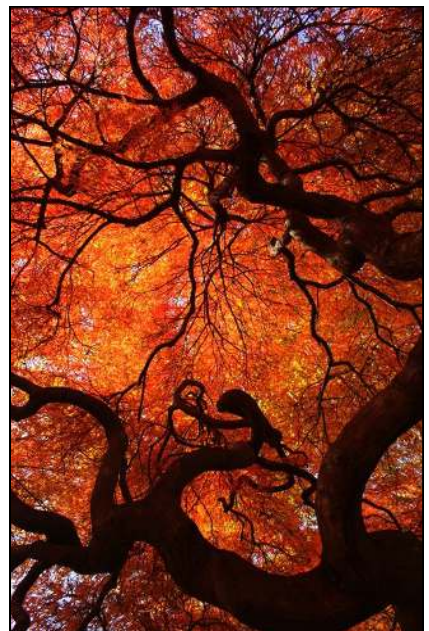

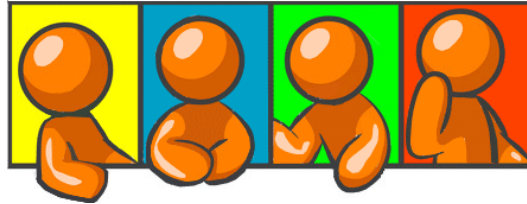

Town Hall Meeting



**AT THE ENCLAVE
OCTOBER 6, 2015**

Present were Diane Fadely, Mike Conron, Pat Vogel, Sharon Garry, Charles Ackerman, Phyllis Mitchell, Linda Gugliemelli, Community Manager and Lisa Shank, On Site Manager. The meeting began at 6:30 with 42 residents in attendance.

A resident expressed his belief that we have the greatest community in the world.

A resident asked about the pruning and mulching schedules for Villa properties. She was directed to her sub-association Board for further information.

A resident expressed a concern about someone using the pool wearing such strong perfume that her breathing was affected and she had to leave the area.

There was a request to have the pool stay open for two additional weeks in September without life-guards present as several other communities are doing. The Board has extensively reviewed this question previously and found it to be prohibitively expensive since we have been told that Howard County law forbids the use of the pool without a lifeguard present. The Board will consult with our lawyer and publish a definitive directive on this matter .

A resident inquired about the number of incidents of theft and car break-ins. We will check with the police department to ascertain the number and pattern of these in the county. An updated meeting with the police is recommended to share their tips for prevention with those new residents who missed the earlier one.

A resident complimented the Social Committee on their schedule of successful events.

A resident inquired about the process for handling unregistered cars which are parked for long periods in the Condo parking lots. Anyone who notices this was asked to contact the OSM who will issue citations.

The meeting concluded at 7:10.

MINUTES OF ENCLAVE BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S MEETING

OCTOBER 6, 2015

Present: Diane Fadely, Charles Ackerman, Pat Vogel, Michael Conron, Sharon Garry, Phyllis Mitchell, Linda Gugliemelli, Lisa Shank. Absent: Juliana Kopec

The meeting was called to order by the president at 7:05 following the Town Hall meeting. The secretary reported that there was a quorum present. A motion was made and seconded to dispense with the reading of the minutes and accept them as written. The vote was all in favor. A motion was made and seconded to dispense with the open forum as the community had opportunity for input during the preceding Town Hall meeting. The vote was all in favor.

There was no President's report.

1. **THE TREASURER** reported that for the 8 month period ending August 30, we are over budget by \$16,000, primarily due to the high snow removal costs which were \$109,000, well over the \$40,000 budgeted. Landscaping is running \$10,000 below budget. Repair and replacement reserves are \$426,000 and fully funded. Total equity is now at \$473,000.

No committee reports were presented.

2. **UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

- i. The OSM met with the community volunteers who were reviewing the new website and their suggested changes have been implemented. We are hopeful that it will be up and running soon.
- ii. All the clubhouse furniture restoration has been completed.
- iii. The fitness supplier will be shipping the correct piece of equipment and removing the one sent in error.

3. **ITEMS NEEDING BOARD VOTE:**

- i. A motion was made and seconded to ratify the Fireline repair authorization. The final cost was lower than proposed as the work was done in less time than estimated. The vote was all in favor.
- ii. A motion was made and seconded to ratify the re-employment of Goldklang for this year's audit at a cost comparable to last year. The vote was all in favor.
- iii. A motion was made and seconded that the traffic calming study should not be undertaken. The vote was all in favor.
- iv. A motion was made and seconded to accept the proposal from American Pool for \$26,000 for 2016. The vote was all in favor.
- v. A motion was made and seconded to ratify the proposal for the repair of the clubhouse entrance with stamped concrete at a cost of \$3200. The vote was all in favor.
- vi. A motion was made and seconded to accept the proposal from Kenwood for the kitchen renovation not to exceed \$30,000. The vote was all in favor. It was suggested that informational addendums to the minutes could be used to keep the community better informed of ongoing Board projects.

4. **INFORMATIONAL ITEMS:**

- i. The CD that was coming due has been placed in the money market account in anticipation of upcoming expenses.

- ii. New solar lighting has been installed in the mail kiosks. The timing is being adjusted to keep the lights on for a longer period.
- iii. The landscaping contractor has completed the cotoneaster replacements on the hill on Buckingham.

5. OPEN FORUM:

- i. A resident made a request that additional tables and umbrellas be purchased for the pool area.
- ii. The Board took this opportunity to publicly acknowledge the tremendous effort put forth by our committees. We thank you for offering your time and expertise to make the Enclave an even better place to live. Those in attendance were encouraged to become active members of these committees and run for positions on their respective Boards as well as the HOA Board which has an election coming due in December.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 and was followed by an Executive Board meeting.

Winterizing Your Home

With fall on the way, this is the perfect time to get your home ready for the cold weather and prevent those uncomfortable changes from affecting your house. Get the indoors and outdoors in shape with these smart ways to winterize your home.

As you ready your house for the colder months ahead, don't forget about your water system. When water freezes, it expands. So if the temperature of your pipes drops below 32 degrees, even for a short period, you run the risk of a pipe fracture or worse. Take the following precautions now to avoid a major headache later.

Inside Your Home

Anywhere cold air blows on a pipe, it creates the potential for freezing. To make sure your pipes are well-insulated, close crawl space vents and stuff insulation over the openings. Even a tiny hole can let a lot of cold air blow in; make sure you fill in all the cracks.

A bathroom or laundry room located above or next to a garage can be particularly vulnerable, so keep the garage door closed to maintain maximum heat.

If your bathroom pipes run along an outside exterior wall, try keeping the vanity door(s) open to allow heat inside. If you're anticipating a deep freeze, consider using a fan to help circulate the air near the pipes, or purchase a small space heater for some extra temporary heat.

Finally, never turn off the heat when you leave home during the winter. Instead, set the temperature to at least 62 degrees F (higher if you've had problems in the past or live in an area of extreme cold). If you have multiple heat zones, be sure to adjust all thermostats appropriately.

Outside Your Home

Disconnect and store garden hoses. If your home has a separate shut-off for external faucets, turn it off and drain the water from those faucets. For some homes the faucets are located in the basements and have red knobs. Make sure you do not turn off the main water supply. Know where your main waterline shut-off is *before* problems arise.

Signs You Have Frozen Pipes

- You turn on the faucet but nothing comes out. Look in the most likely places and use the techniques listed above to gently thaw the area. Whatever you do, *do not* use a blowtorch to warm up a frozen pipe. Many homes have been set on fire this way.
- The water is turned off but you hear rushing water running anyway. This could be a sign that you have a leak somewhere. You should turn off the water lines immediately

Clean your gutters.

Crispy falling leaves and wet weather are on their way in. Make sure your home is properly prepared for the fall and winter climate changes by cleaning out your gutters and getting a fresh start, free of leafy build-up. Carefully brave this challenge yourself, with the proper safety precautions and tools, or call in an expert to get the job done.

Deal with drafts.

Find places where your warm air may be escaping and the outdoor chill taking its place—by feeling around door frames and window sills for airflow. Seal any leaks in doors and windows with caulk or weather stripping.

Insulate your home.

This might sound like overkill, but insufficient insulation is responsible for your home's biggest energy costs. Insulating doesn't have to overwhelm you if you tackle it using a smart step-by-step, top-to-bottom plan. Try our insulation guide for a full home insulation check-up and upgrade.

Change your furnace filters.

It's a good idea to have a professional come and check your furnace or boiler before the cold weather creeps in. At the very least, be sure to replace your furnace filters for better warm air flow throughout your home.

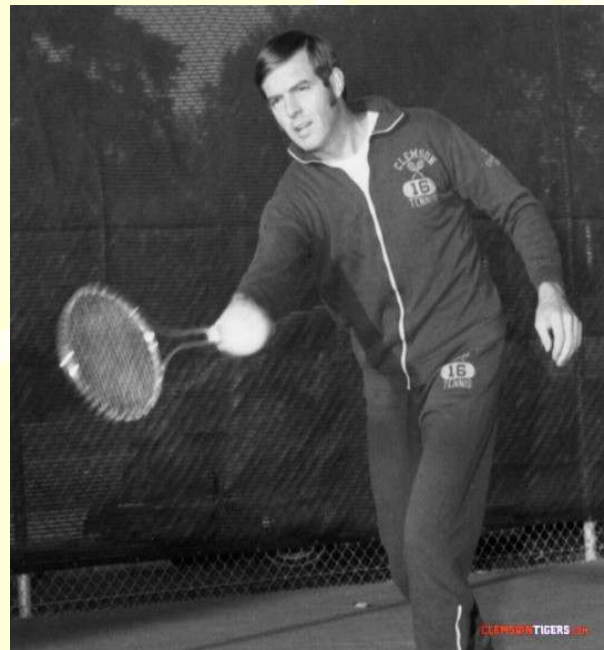
Our Neighbor Coaching Legend, Duane Bruley

Duane Bruley has devoted his life to helping others.

Duane Bruley was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame on the weekend of the Clemson/Georgia Tech Football Game on October 9-10, 2015. The induction ceremony was held at the Brookes Center for the Performing Arts.

He has spent his career teaching and inspiring young people in the classroom, and he also has taught and coached the sport he dearly loves, tennis.

Duane Bruley was the head coach of the men's tennis team at Clemson from 1963-1973. He led the Tigers to their first Atlantic Coast Conference Championship in 1969 and had a 16-0 mark overall that season. He served as the head coach for 11 seasons and also as professor of chemical engineering at Clemson. Bruley had a 150-42 record and is the winningest coach at Clemson in winning pct. for all Tiger coaches with ten or more year's tenure, regardless of sport, in Clemson sports history.



"I got my doctorate at the University of Tennessee and I coached tennis there. I had played in the Knoxville City Tennis Championship and played on the city of Knoxville team and I had been giving tennis lessons and this is how General Robert Neyland, (legendary athletic director and head football coach at Tennessee), heard about me and gave me the job of head tennis coach at the University of Tennessee."

Bruley then went to Clemson.

Impressive Career

Bruley is a professor emeritus in the college of engineering at the University of Maryland Baltimore County and now lives in Ellicott City, MD.

Bruley was a two-sport letter winner at Wisconsin-Eau Claire in football and tennis, and earned his Bachelor of Science degree in chemical engineering at the University of Wisconsin in 1956.

He received a master's of science degree in Mechanical Engineering at Stanford University, OR-SORT degree in Nuclear Engineering from Oak Ridge School of Reactor Technology, and his doctorate in Chemical Engineering from the University of Tennessee.

During his career, Bruley has served as Dean of the School of Engineering at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, Dean of Engineering at the California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo, Vice President of Academic Affairs at Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, Head of Biomedical Engineering and Director of the Rehabilitation Engineering, at Louisiana Tech University, Director of The Bioengineering and Environmental Engineering Division at the National Science Foundation, and Head of the Chemical Engineering Department at Tulane University. He was also a chemical engineering professor at Clemson.

Bruley is a co-founder and former President 1973 and of the International Society on Oxygen Transport to Tissue (ISOTT) and one of the contributors to the formation of the Bioengineering Section at the NSF and initiator of a joint review and funding effort between the NSF and the National Institutes of Health (NIH).

He also was the Head Men's Tennis Coach at Tennessee, Clemson and Tulane.

Bruley Continues Academic and Coaching Career at Clemson

“I had a job offer at Clemson teaching in their chemical engineering department, and I was really excited about it. I had no idea about the head tennis coach’s job being open at Clemson. In fact, I didn’t think I would coach anymore.”

But Clemson is certainly glad he furthered his coaching career.

“It so happens that Coach Frank Howard contacted me once I accepted the teaching job at Clemson. He told me they were losing their coach this season and he needed a tennis coach. Again, I hadn’t planned on coaching tennis anymore, but it was so tempting that I took the offer. I really appreciate Coach Howard helping me and giving me the opportunity to be the head tennis coach at Clemson.

“I remember one day that Coach Howard wanted to see me. I nervously went to his office; I had no idea what he wanted. “He told me in his gruff voice, ‘You know Bruley, I always thought tennis was a sissy sport. But I just want to shake your hand and congratulate you. Anyone that beats Georgia Tech is all right with me.’ I will never forget that. We had beaten Georgia Tech earlier in the week. He told me I was doing a great job, so I felt really good about what we were doing.

“I also officiated junior tournaments and I got to meet some wonderful people, and this helped in our recruiting as well.

Bruley's First Match at Clemson was Memorable

“I never will forget my first match as head tennis coach at Clemson. We were playing our rival, South Carolina, in then a conference match on March 23, 1963. We defeated the Gamecocks 9-0. What made this match so unbelievable is that we did not lose a game in the entire match! We won every set 6-0. All six singles and all three doubles matches were 6-0, 6-0. I never heard of a Division 1 match being won like that before or since. It was a great way to start my career at Clemson.”

The Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame

“I’m excited about being inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame this fall,” said Bruley. “When you go into a hall of fame you take many people in with you. I would like to thank my former players and assistant coaches for making this possible. This honor seems surreal to me. It was the effort of a lot of people including my wife (Suzanne) and three sons, Scott, Randy, and Mark, and all the players and assistant coaches. It’s not an honor just for me, but for everyone surrounding me during my coaching days.

“Tennis is a sport where it encompasses athletic and mental abilities. It’s one sport that has it all—physical demands such as strength, speed, and endurance and it requires that you use your mental capabilities to think quickly and sharply to be able to excel at the game. In other words, it’s like a chess game in a physical sport.

“Tennis can help you prepare for other aspects of life with the training and discipline that is necessary for the sport,” said Bruley. You can carry the training and discipline over to other areas of life, and it will help you succeed.

“I got interested in tennis when my parents bought me a tennis racket at an early age. At Chippewa Falls High School, our football coach required us to play a spring sport. So I started running track, but I soon switched to tennis. So I credit my parents and my high school for developing my love for the game that continues to this day,” said Bruley.

“Clemson was a wonderful place for me and my family. All three of my sons were born at Clemson. I’ve been to a lot of colleges and universities during my career, but I think Clemson is the most balanced that I have seen. Clemson excels in the classroom and in athletics; it’s a very special place.”

QUICK FALL WEATHER FARE: LAZY BAKED ZITI

This recipe is from one of my favorite blogs: Smitten Kitchen, written by Deb Perelman. She cooks in a tiny kitchen in NYC and makes the best food. This dish is also a tip of the hat to MY maternal grandmother Rose who made great baked ziti. But this “lazy” version (of which I think grandma would have approved) is a quickie and very much a goodie!!! Best of all, it makes a bundle and it can be frozen!!!! So, eat some tonight, freeze two other portions for the depths of winter. You’ll pat yourself on the back for it later!! Oh, and do have a nice green salad and glass of vino with it. Chianti or whatever good drinking red you happen to have available!

Ingredients

- Glug of olive oil (technical term for about a tablespoon or two)
- 1 medium onion, chopped small
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 28-ounce can whole tomatoes with juices, chopped by you, or crushed tomatoes
- 1/4 pound (4 ounces) baby spinach or a few handfuls of another green, cut into thin ribbons
- 3/4 pound mozzarella, coarsely grated (or buy grated mozzarella)
- 1 pound ground beef or Italian sausage, casings removed
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- Red pepper flakes, to taste
- 1 pound pasta, cooked al dente and drained (try using ziti if you like crispy bits after cooking!)
- 2/3 cup finely grated pecorino or parmesan cheese

For Serving

- Ricotta cheese for serving on the side after the dish is heated.
 - Slivers of basil to sprinkle on top of the dish when ready to serve.
1. Cook pasta until quite al dente, or 2 minutes less than the suggested cooking time. (It will keep cooking in the sauce, then in the oven . If you cook it too long in water it will be mushy!!)
 2. Reserve 1/2 cup cooking water, then drain pasta.
 3. Heat large sauté pan over medium heat. Coat with glug of olive oil, and heat oil. Add meat and cook with onion, garlic, oregano, pepper flakes, and salt over medium-high heat for 6 to 8 minutes or until meat is browned; stirring frequently. If using plain ground beef only, really season this well. Don’t be shy.
 4. Add crushed tomatoes and stir to combine. Reduce heat to medium-low and simmer for 5 minutes. Adjust seasonings to taste. If it’s become quite thick, stir in reserved pasta water. Add spinach and cook until wilted, just another minute. Stir in drained pasta and heat together for one minute.
 5. Pour half of pasta mixture into a 9×13-inch baking dish, lasagna pan, or other 4-quart baking vessel (or divide among smaller ones, if you’d like to freeze some for later!!) Sprinkle with half of pecorino/paremsan and mozzarella. Pour remaining pasta and sauce over, and finish with remaining cheeses. Bake in heated oven for 30 minutes .If you wish, you can run the dish under your broiler for a minute or two for an extra-bronzed lid right before serving.

If you want to freeze some, cover the dish with foil and freeze (don’t forget to mark what it is). Defrost in the refrigerator overnight and heat as if you’re making it from scratch!!

It’s fast, easy and soooooo good!!! And, in the words of the immortal Julia, *Bon Appetit!*
